Imagery: Language that appeals to the senses. Descriptive writing paints a picture.

Simile: A figure of speech that involves a direct comparison and using the words "as" or "like"

Metaphor: A figure of speech which involves a comparison but **does not** use the words "as" or "like"

Personification: A figure of speech which gives the qualities of a person to an animal or an object.

Onomatopoeia: The use of words that mimic sounds. These appeal to our sense of hearing and help bring the description to life.

Hyperbole: An exaggerated statement. It's not used to mislead but rather to emphasize a point.
